Three members of our clergy who have contributed in so many ways to the well-being and spiritual growth of our community have just or are about to step down from their current roles. **Monsignor Tom McGrath** celebrated the fiftieth anniversary of his ordination last year. Following his move to Alresford a few years ago from the parish of Maidenhead, he has assisted first Canon Paul Townsend and then Fr Mark Hogan in the running of the Catholic Parish of St Peter's and the Winchester Martyrs of which St Gregory's is part. Fr Tom has always extended a very warm welcome to our Christian brothers and one of the highlights must be the ecumenical celebration, inspired by the lona services, which he led to celebrate the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. We are delighted that he remains in Alresford.

Reverend Ruth Fry, a keen supporter of CTiA, has been an inspirational speaker at our Away Weekends in recent years, taking an active role in our joint worships whenever her demanding schedule has allowed her to do so. Reverend Ruth is continuing her mission in another part of Hampshire, overseeing and supporting youth and children's work, and first-half of life worship in Chandler's Ford and Eastleigh Methodist Church.

A little further south, the Isle of Wight, is where **Reverend Julia Myles** has moved o become Spiritual Care Lead at Mountbatten Hospice early next year. Reverend Julia has embraced the ecumenical activity of Churches Together in Alresford with enthusiasm. Memories of her creative workshops in Bournemouth – from drawing sheep to building boats – and a lively Songs of Praise in Old Alresford last year spring to mind.

We are thankful for the gifts of wisdom, spirituality and for the sense of humour and fellowship Fr Tom, Reverend Ruth and Reverend Julia have shared with us. We wish them every blessing in their new phase of life.
